"The (Ferndale Library) staff provided excellent services throughout the pandemic," said Gregg Thacker, another Ferndale resident/library patron. "We can only imagine how much work it was behind the scenes to keep things running and develop new ways of working safely."

"The children's section of the library is our toddlers 'third place', and is her favorite place to go," said Laura Mikulski, Ferndale resident, and City Council member. "All the staff have been incredibly kind, and have been welcome faces during a formative time for our child. The Youth Librarians have been so willing to guide us, interact, and provide that human element and familiarity that I think we forget is a huge part of what we crave."

In times of crisis, libraries and library staff can play a critical role in continuing to support their communities. All throughout the pandemic, libraries of all types continued making a difference in people's lives by providing access to digital resources and virtual programs, which was something their communities needed more than ever at that time.
